We have just returned from the Multiple District Convention in Newcastle. It was interesting seeing Newcastle so soon after the disastrous tornado like event that they had just experienced 10 days before. There were still a lot of trees down, and power still being slowly restored to some of the outlying countryside. The rain was still around but nothing like they had previously experienced.

The Convention was reasonably well attended with some very interesting events and speakers. The Youth of the Year final was conducted on stage with the winner Patrick Cross, sponsored by Bardon Lions Club . All the students were amazing and it was a very close final result. The Leo of the Year final was also conducted and once again congratulations to all the participants.

All the notices of motions were passed as tabled, including the increase in dues. The dues will increase to \$37.00 (including GST) per member per annum from 1st July 2015, to \$40.00 (including GST) per member per annum from 1st July 2016, then to \$43.00 (including GST) per member per annum from 1st July 2017. It is then proposed to have CPI increases annually thereafter. The full explanation of these were distributed to all Clubs prior to the convention.

The first of the Leadership forums has just been held in Elizabeth. 22 people attended with a lot of very positive feedback coming from the participants.

The second one to be held in Port Lincoln has had to be cancelled due to the lack of support from local Clubs, there was only one registration! This is particularly disappointing as presenters had booked and paid for accommodation to facilitate this Forum and put a lot of effort and time into preparing for it.

The next Forum will be held in Clare on Saturday the 13th of June with a fourth to be held at Adelaide University on Saturday the 4th of July.

Please support these forums, a lot of people have put in a lot of effort updating and re-writing the content to teach or refresh the future and current Club Executives in what is expected of them. The Club Executives are running an Incorporated body (Their Lions Club) and have a legal responsibility to do this properly. The excuse of "I didn't know" does not carry any weight if something goes wrong!

Thank you to all the Lions in our District, for making this year so special for myself and my husband John. We both look forward to meeting you all again in the next few years. I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the District Governor handover, where I will be handing over the reins of the District to VDG Rob Royal. Youth of the year

Tentative dates to be confirmed by new YOTY chair.

Club finals to be completed by Sept. 20th. and form with the club and statistics details and winners entry forms sent to the Zone Chair conducting the zone/combined zone finals.

Zone/combined zones finals to be completed by Oct. 4th. and results/entry forms sent to District Chair for YOTY together with the statistics/results/winners entry forms etc.

District Final on Saturday 17th Oct. at the District Convention

Prize Recommendations (From MD and accepted by C1 District Cabinet)

Last year, the Youth of the Year sub-committee, along with Immediate past Council Chair, Gary Parker and Executive Officer, Rob Oerlemans, conducted a strategic review of the Youth of the Year Program.

Some of the key features, which were approved by the Council of Governors in January 2014, were published in the June-July edition of the magazine (LION).

The committee also made recommendations concerning prizes. The committee was aware of major disparities between clubs of the awards that were made to contestants. The sub-committee recommends that awards should be comparable across the clubs, zones, regions, districts and states.

Whilst clubs and districts have the freedom to determine awards we recommend the following as guidelines for acknowledgement and recognition of your contestants:

CLUB FINALS

- All contestants receive a participation certificate, YOTY pen or similar.
- Winner; receives a certificate and a gift voucher to the value of \$50.
- Public Speaking winner; receives certificate and a gift voucher to the value of \$25.
- Costs borne by club

ZONE/MULTI ZONE/REGION FINALS

- All contestants receive a participation certificate.
- Winner; receives a certificate.
- Public Speaking winner; receives a certificate.
- Prizes and venue costs met by District, transport and other costs by club.

DISTRICT FINALS

- All contestants receive a participation certificate.
- Winner; certificate, keepsake trophy; award to value of \$100. **Note that C1 has three contestants chosen to go to state level**
- Public Speaking Winner; certificate, keepsake trophy; award to value of \$50.
- Prizes costs and venue met by District. Contestants who require accommodation and live a long drive from the venue will have it provided by the District by negotiated arrangement. Other costs by club.

STATE FINALS

- All contestants receive a participation certificate.
- Winner; certificate, keepsake trophy; \$500 from MD; medallion from MD
- Public Speaking Winner; certificate, keepsake trophy; award to value of \$50. As soon as your club final has been completed it's final, the club YOTY Chair should forward the names and contact details of the club's contestants to the District Chair. **We have not been very good with this**

C1 District is required to contribute \$1000 (historically) to the costs of running the final. The state coordinator controls this budget.

Public Speaking (from MD)

For some years the Public Speaking rules, 2.4.4, stipulate that penalties will apply under certain circumstances, however, the manuals do not specify a penalty.

A recent meeting of the National YOTY sub-committee determined that these penalties will apply:

It was agreed that for the IMPROMPTU QUESTIONS a 0.25 point penalty will apply, where the contestant proceeds beyond the completion of the current sentence after the elapse of 2 minutes.

It was agreed that for the PREPARED SPEECHES a 0.5 point penalty will apply, where the contestant proceeds beyond the completion of the current sentence after the elapse of 5 minutes. This penalty will also apply to those contestants who do not proceed beyond 4½ minutes of elapsed time.

These penalties should be made known to contestants at their initial club briefing and again when they are to commence their public speaking.

Judges, too, should be made aware of these penalties.

Rachel was a co-ordinator for relief efforts for the Sampson Flat Bushfires and had won a part scholarship for the conference, but exhausted funds helping others and ran out of cash to finance the trip.

Mr King was pleased to advise that she will be heading to the Gold Coast next month thanks to the generosity of the Lions Club of Paralowie (who gave \$750) and 13 other individuals. All but one donation came from either pensioners or people she had helped out during the fires.

Vale Donato Vignogna of the Lions Club of Adelaide Italian

The Lions Club of Adelaide Italian lost a stalwart, Don Vignogna in February. He was quite simply the kind of member that no club can operate without, always willing to pitch in, doing more than his share to ensure the club's success.

After his induction in 2002, Don dived right in, actively participating in all our activities, never for praise or self-glorification and always for the love of service and helping others. Unfortunately illness forced him to slow down and eventually to stop. He was 68.

Don was a club director for eight years, Lion Tamer for nine, and always a great supporter of and participant in our annual amateur wine making competition, often bringing home an award.

In their eulogy his daughters recalled that their dad "was renowned for making the best home-made pizza and red wine in town."

They also recalled that Don liked helping people and had a passion for fixing things, and that whatever he fixed "would work properly and be long-lasting."

Honouring Don's strong attachment to Lions, his family requested for donations to our club in lieu of flowers. At tis writing the responses from Don's wide circle of friends have totalled almost \$2100.

In addition to Don's wife Frances, and daughters Rosanne and Lucy, Don is survived by granddaughters Layne, Evie and Sarina.

A gentle reminder to all Club Secretaries.

There is a special type of Lions Club in our system whose prime reason for being in existence is to help "Stop the Drop". This Lions Club is Australian Lionsonoz, or simply Lionsonoz.

Lionsonoz was formed in 2009 and chartered in Melbourne by the then International President Al Brandell with 23 members.

The idea of Lionsonoz came from the experiences of charter members Lions Kel and Yvie Kearns when they retired, bought a mobile home and took off to see Australia. They found at many caravan parks other Lions who have done the same thing, however they were quite concerned about the greater percentage of those Lions who had lost touch with their own Clubs and had eventually resigned from Lions altogether. This represented a large number of dropped Lions who could have stayed on as members if a suitable Lions Club was in existence to cater for these "Grey Nomads".

It took no time to get a Lions Club off the ground to cater for these special people. Lionsonoz has a membership at present of over 40, but it is in constant change.

When a member of a "Main Stream " Lions Club wants to join Lionsonoz, all he/she needs to do is ask his/her secretary to apply for transfer. The normal rules of transfer apply.

When their travelling days are over, they simply transfer back to a Club of their choosing.

Lionsonoz is definitely not out to "poach" members, it's prime objective is to help retain good Lions who would likely fall by the wayside if this special type of Lions Club was not available to them.

Lionsonoz does not have an activities account. They do not raise or donate moneys. The members achieve service hours by offering their assistance to the

Lions Clubs in which town they visit. It works out very well.

It has helped many Lions who find themselves Club-less when their own Lions Club folds and for ladies of the Lions family who are not welcome in a males only Lions Club.

Lionsonoz does not cater for non-Lions. The applicant must have had Lions experience because of the difficulties a non-Lion would have with the isolation and lack of personal contact with other Lions members.

A transferee must also be computer literate and have available computer connection to the internet because the meetings are conducted through Skype Messenger on the third Monday evening of the month.

Rebecca said she was looking forward to becoming involved in the club again, after giving birth, and bringing Aiden along to the meetings.



Their doctors are very pleased with the machine and very appreciative of our donation.



WEST BEACH LIONS

Over the past 2 years the West Beach Lions have been helping a family by paying part of the annual school fees for their 7 year old son who has a vision impairment (nystagmus) and Cerebral Palsy. This year with the help of a Compassionate grant from ALF and the Dick Smith Foundation, we have paid for the full 2015 annual school fee, purchased a keyboard and stand, a bicycle and 2 iPads. The school he attends will help by putting on the iPad appropriate apps to help with his school work. He has a vision of normal font at 5cm and 18 font at 20cm so he will be able to adjust the font on the iPad. He will have one iPad at school and the other at home to help him with extra school work.

Because he is unable to play sport, he is learning the keyboard, trying to remember the sound of the notes as his vision is not strong enough to see the written notes. He loves his bike and when presented to him, was eager to ride the bike out of the shop. The action of peddling will strengthen his weak left leg. The Manager of the Cycleworx Avanti Plus shop was very helpful in instructing Isaac on how to ride the bike, taking into effect his weaker and shorter left leg.

We felt very privileged to be able to help this family and will be visiting them often, watching Isaac's journey.
